The Ph.D. in Aging Studies program is a campus-wide, interdisciplinary research training program hosted by the USF School of Aging Studies. Students select research mentors from among the faculty and develop individually tailored training programs, generally focused in one of four areas: Aging and Mental Health, Cognitive Aging and Alzheimer's disease, Public Policy and Long-Term Care, and Aging and Health. The program provides options for research abroad and professional development.
