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Bridge to Graduate School Overview

Bridge to Graduate School is an undergraduate course that explores and prepares students for graduate education. Through course readings, one-on-one mentorship, and academic and professional preparation, students will learn how to translate their experiences into a graduate or professional school application portfolio. Although the course focuses on equipping students with the knowledge and skills to immediately transition into graduate study, students will have an opportunity to identify resources and develop a plan that best suits their needs and goals.

At the completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Tailor graduate programs, institutions, and locations to their personal interest, goals, and journey.
- Critically analyze the required elements of a graduate or professional school application
- Identify key components and resources for graduate school preparation including degree funding, test preparation, and required application materials.
- Develop and obtain materials for the graduate or professional school application including the personal statement, resume, letters of recommendation, cover letter, etc.
- Establish a broad network of peers, staff, and faculty support for the process.
- Utilize course materials and knowledge to apply to graduate or professional school.

Curriculum Overview

Bridge to Graduate School meets biweekly and explores topics to support students in the graduate school application process. Below is an outline of each week's content:

- Week 1 Course Introduction, Expectations & Relationship Building
- Week 2 Researching Schools and Finding Your Fit
- Week 3 The Graduate School Journey Community Panel (Graduate Students)
- Week 4 Writing a Personal Statement
- Week 5 Funding your Graduate Education
- Week 6 Resume & Cover Letter
- Week 7 Demystifying the Application Process Community Panel (Faculty)
- Week 8 Final Presentations
 - Students provide brief presentations on their Bridge experience and submit a Professional Map with the following materials:
 - Overview of 3-5 top program choices
 - Personal Statement
 - Resume
 - Cover Letter

Mentor Duties

- Provide advice and guidance to assigned student(s) during their Bridge to Graduate School experience
- Serve as guest panelists during the Bridge to Graduate School seminars
- Document engagement and support of assigned students
- Commit to engaging in culturally affirming practices

Student Reflections from Undergraduates Supported by Mentors and Bridge Program

- I am grateful to have Bridge because it simplified this entire process and reiterated that the things I needed for my next steps were already within me. I was fortunate to gain a few mentors and make needed connections as well.
- Bridge to Grad school has made a huge impact on my graduate school goals! At the beginning of the semester, I wasn't even sure if I wanted to go to grad school, but now I know I want to, and maybe even take a gap year in between!
- Bridge to Graduate School has played a major part in supporting my graduate school

 dissecting into schools a little more and being surrounded by individuals who wants to
 further their education was a blessing. This gave me the push to keep going despite the
 different circumstances that may come in my way.

- Bridge to Gap School played a huge role in my planning for grad school by me having to effectively plane for grad built into my schedule, giving me no excuse to look into the opportunities available. I believe everything about Bridge to Grad School is great.
- I am most proud of my ability to apply to graduate school. Before this class, I was not confident in my abilities at all. Currently, I am ready to take on this new challenge. I was blessed to meet other minorities that are like-minded and have similar goals. I am so excited to apply to graduate school, and I will definitely apply these same lessons when I apply for my doctorate's degree.
